Wellhead: Reconstructed, 1950, from archaeological evidence.


919 South Main: Reconstructed, 1967, from archaeological and documentary evidence, the interior adapted for residential use.

Eberhardt House + Shop - P. Frank L. Horton

Lot 99 (919 and 921 S. Main St.). The locksmith Lewis F. Eberhardt, son of the clockmaker, built his storey-and-a-half central chimney frame dwelling, with lean-to shop on the north gable, in 1832. The LEWIS EBERHARDT HOUSE, somewhat altered, was restored to its original exterior form by the owner in 1951. The small separate SHOP north of the main house was reconstructed in 1967 on its original site, as determined by archaeology. The original structure was built in 1833, Eberhardt adding the blacksmith trade to his way of making a living, Frank L. Horton now owns the property.
